ORDINANCE 15

TO PROVIDE AGAINST THE EVILS RESULTING FROM THE TRAFFIC IN INTOXICATING LIQUORS

Section 1 Be it ordained by the council of the incorporated village of Ottoville, Putnam County, Ohio. That the sale of intoxicating liquor whether distilled malts or vinous within the corporation of said village of Ottoville o the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, example by a regular druggist on the written prescription of a regular practicing physician for medical purpose only is hereby decreed to be unlawful and all places within said incorporated village of Ottoville where such intoxicating liquor are on other days sold or exposed for sale except regular drug stores shall on that day be closed and whoever makes any such sale or allowed any such place be open or remain open on that day shall be fined in any sum exceeding fifty dollars and cost of prosecution and shall be in all cases stand committed to prison of said village until such fine and costs re paid. In regular hotels and eating houses within said corporation of Ottoville the word place herein used be held to mean the room or part of room where such liquors are usually sold or exposed for sale and the keeping of such rooms securely closed shall be held as such hotels and eating houses as a closing of the place within the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 2 That it shall be unlawful for the keeper of any grocery and saloon eating houses, ale houses, beer houses; or other places of public resort where intoxicating liquors whether distilled malts or vinous are sold within said corporated Village of Ottoville to keep or permit the same to be open or to remain open between the hours of 10.30 PM and four o'clock am of the night season ands any persons upon conviction of a violation of this action shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) and shall pay all costs of prosecution and shall stand committed o the prison of said Village until such fines and costs are paid.

Section 3 This ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after the tenth day of July A.D. 1895
